James D'León solo piano

Born in South Korea into a musical family, James D'León began the piano at the young age of 4 and performed his first recital at the age of 5. He was awarded a full scholarship to the prestigious Pre-College program at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music.

At age 12 he relocated to Pennsylvania for studies with Miriam Gottlieb.

By age 14, he had won every local competition in the state culminating in his debut with the Philadelphia Orchestra at the Academy of Music performing the Rachmaninoff Piano Concerto No 2. In 2009, he was selected to become an official Steinway Artist listed on both the prestigious New York and Hamburg, Germany rosters. Since then, his performances have taken him throughout England, Ireland, Italy, Germany, Canada, and 40 states throughout the continental United States. Today, D'León is known as a rare and completely versatile pianist who is just as comfortable performing a concerto as he would be playing a full solo recital or accompanying an instrumentalist or singer.
