Jacqueline Zander-Wall joined the faculty in 2006 as Lecturer in Voice. Raised in Albuquerque, she has returned after many years of singing nationally and internationally. After receiving three degrees from the University of California at Santa Barbara, she studied vocal pedagogy through an international Rotary Scholarship at the Hochschule für Musik in Hamburg, and was in the lied class of Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau at the Hochschule in Berlin. She received a diploma as a fellow from the Opera Institute in Boston University, where she studied with Phyllis Curtin. She has also been a fellow at the Aspen Music Festival, the Ost West Musik Akademie, the Britten-Pears School in Alteburg England, the Vienna Meisterkurs, the Vocal Institute in Santa Barbara, and the Music Academy of the West.

Felecia Caton Garcia's poetry has appeared in journals such as The Northwest Review, Blue Mesa Review, The Indiana Review, is forthcoming in Prairie Schooner, and she is the recent recipient of the 2007 ACM Chicago Literary Award in poetry. Felecia holds an MFA in Creative Writing from the University of Oregon and she is completing a doctorate in American Studies at the University of New Mexico where she has taught courses on race, class, gender, and hip-hop culture. Felecia offers workshops in intercultural communication and curriculum development and she works as the Learning Community Coordinator at Central New Mexico Community College.

Violinist David Felberg is currently Associate Principle Concertmaster of the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra. An Albuquerque native, he received a degree in History from the University of Arizona Tucson and a masters degree in Music from the University of New Mexico. He is much in demand as soloist, chamber musician, conductor, composer, producer and teacher. He performs alot of contemporary music both with his violin and as director of Chatter.

Justin Pollak, a native of Santa Fe, first studied violin with Catherine Nichols. As a student at UNM he studied with Leonard Felberg and Bernard Zinck, as well as Kimberly Fredenburg on viola. Justin is currently a member of the New Mexico and Santa Fe Symphony Orchestras.

Cellist Felix Wurman is a member of the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra. He studied cello with Jacqueline duPre and Anner Bylsma. He founded the Chamber music group Domus which performed worldwide in a portable geodesic concert hall. He played with the Lyric Opera of Chicago. Performing full time on a 5-string cello, he has a repertoire which includes violin works like Bach's Partitas and Sonatas.

Marcio Rodriguez is a violist from Brazil. He is in the Masters Program at UNM under Kim Fredenburg.

Guitarist/vocalist/cellist/barista Lisa Donald hails from Albuquerque. She spent nine years on the east coast (New York City and Miami) and in Kansas City before returning to Albuquerque last year. Se studied cello with Keith Robinson of the Miami String Quartet and Carter Enyeart. Lisa can be heard playing cello and guitar and singing on a number of recording projects including those of singer/songwriters Molly Magdalain, Joel Kraft, Sarah Perottaand Third Border. She is the head barista for EspressoArtists and The Grove Cafe and Market in Albuquerque.
